Mendocino County Library Advisory Board Minutes of November 18, 2020 Via Zoom

Prior to Library Director's report, B. Chapman clarified that all agendas, supporting documents and registration for Zoom link could be found on website.

Chair Zimmermann added that branch reports are included in the thorough Director's Report so only key highlights for branch reports are needed. However, specific items which need to be discussed/reported, can be included in agenda.

Library Director's Report:

A. Library Director's report

Nicole Bird read Ms. Horner's last report, gave highlights of branch reports, and answered questions about current status of library. The staff at all libraries are very busy and working hard.

- The Bookmobile has been able to provide services while addressing COVID procedures; compliance and utilization are high.
- The Coast Community Branch with only 1.5 staff maintains a high level of check outs and books lent out of county.
- Fort Bragg Branch had 6,000 monthly checkouts focusing on providing the best curbside service possible. Modified Paul Bunyan weekend was celebrated with on-line programming, crafts, reading of tall tale and Paul and Babe puppet craft bags.
- Round Valley has started Reading Radio (also available to stream) consisting of interviews or audiobooks as well as a Zoom Storytime
- Willits Branch was impacted with closures from the Oak Fire and evacuations. Curbside services are very successful and return hours were increased. Current programs are virtual.
- Ukiah Branch M. Carr shared highlights which included expansion of STEAM virtual program, Comic Book Day, Seed Library, and Social Justice Book Club as well as coordination with other branches to address 1,000 Books before Kindergarten effort.

B. Progress on Plan for Library Re-openings- N. Bird suggested B. Chapman report.

There have been regular collaborative meetings to discuss and draft plan for reopening. At this time the library would like to base their services as if it were one tier more restricted than actual tier, e.g., if in tier orange, proceed as if in tier red. To begin, they would be open 2 days for 4 hours a day at 25% capacity

for check out only. As appropriate, services would progressively increase. All safety measures such as sneeze guards, masks, hand sanitizer, social distancing, no bathrooms, etc. are part of the plan. Branches have some specific needs addressed in plans such as Security Guard for Ukiah.

Plan has been submitted to Sarah Dukett, Deputy Chief Executive Office who is overseeing this effort and all plans will go through environmental health. After go-ahead, promotion and information will continue virtually and via press releases. There will be opportunities for flexibility in duties so that health issues may be accommodated.

In the interim period:

- · All fines are waived
- 10 pages of free printing per patron per week can be requested
- Books will be guarantined 3 days (For all Consortium)
- **C. Year to Date Budget -** Reviewed and discussed the budget, projections, diminishing reserve and future revenue from Measure A. We are spending less and will have carry over. In regards to FEMA reimbursement, personnel costs are tracked by time sheets codes. B. Chapman reports that any reimbursement will not be immediate and could take a very long time. Some budgeted expenses will be reimbursed from grants and E rate and the library is delaying hiring. B. Chapman said that she could give the LAB an update in Jan. with quarterly projections.

Subcommittee on Measure A - D. Riley, M. Schaeffer, L. Zimmermann

D. Laytonville Satellite update, MOU S. Haven

B. Chapman and Consultant K. Horner have worked together with Laytonville Friends and have been extremely helpful in the process of getting MOU which is now being reviewed by County Counsel. S. Haven gave un update on services being offered and the Friends collaboration with other community entities to support schools and community

E. Ukiah Library Long-term improvement L. Zimmermann

Friends of the Ukiah Library has received Asset Forfeiture Funds as promised; special thanks to Supervisor McCowan for his assistance. The Friends now have the \$20,000 to conduct a Needs Assessment.

F. Fort Bragg expansion and fund-raising efforts – J. Marcell, C. Schneider

The Friends have \$80,000 in funds and will be restructuring their budget. Their on line book sales made \$700 in one month. Currently they are researching possible grants to help with their efforts. Their brochure is in the final stages and features ways to contribute to expansion as part of financial planning.

G. Update on Joint Meeting with Board of Supervisors – Nothing to report

New Business

A. Grant Awards

In coordination with CENIC - High-Speed Broadband California

Libraries Grant for \$94,808.48 effective immediately after Board Approval. The library will be off the County circuit, speed will be ten times faster than current system and should address the library's needs for years to come. County IT very supportive of this move. Much time and effort were put into this endeavor and the LAB recognizes Barb Chapman and staff for seeing this to fruition.

Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA)

N. Bird applied for and was awarded a \$5,000 grant to enhance the Library's personal finance collections. With current pandemic crisis and recent disasters in the area, resources addressing financial decisions are timely.

Copycat Grant – California State Library

In coordination with Karen Mattson of the County Museum, N. Bird has been authorized to submit a grant proposal for The Memory Lab, portable equipment for digitalizing photos and slides.

Acting Assistant County Librarian's Nov-Dec 2020 Report

Here is the Mendocino County Library's Report for the January 2021 LAB meeting.

In November, the Library completed a tiered plan for reopening the library. The plan was completed in consensus with the branch librarians and Barb Chapman. In essence, the library branches will have a phased reopening that corresponds to the County's current risk level tiers (Widespread-Purple, Substantial-Red, Moderate-Orange, and Minimal-Yellow). The tiered reopening plan has been forwarded to Environmental Health for review.

Mendocino County Libraries are offering a Winter Reading Challenge this January. *Cozy up with a Book!* honors the comfort that can be had when stuck inside on a cold wintry day and being entertained by a wonderful book, whether it be a graphic novel, mystery, biography, romance, or anything else. Winter Reading participants can read any books they like during the challenge, and each participant is asked to read five or more books to complete their individual challenge. The Winter Reading Challenge runs through from January 1-31. Readers can participate online (https://mendolibrary.beanstack.org) and/or contact their local branch to get a paper reading log.

The Mendocino County Library has a new online resource for residents: a <u>YouTube channel</u>, the place to go for stories, songs, crafts, poetry and more! The YouTube channel will be updated regularly and will include Mendocino County Librarians performing children's story time programming and STEAM/STEM craft programs for children and young adults, special guests providing craft instruction, and informational and instructional videos! Bookmobile:

It's been business as usual onboard the Bookmobile through these winter months; Hunter and I have been very busy. Winter is a nice change from the hot weather and the fire danger we experienced all summer. However, rain brings its own challenges when we are out on the road.

The Bookmobile lost one of its regular stops in December, the Chamberlin Creek-Cal-Fire complex closed down. This has been a dedicated stop for over 13 years and we are sad to see it go. It was a pleasure to bring books, music and knowledge to the guys there who helped fight fires, remediate brush and complete storm clean-up. The Bookmobile will still be going to Parlin Forks camp as soon as the Covid-19 restrictions are relaxed and they allow outside



visitors. With the loss of the Chamberlin Creek stop, we added a new stop at Cleone. The Bookmobile will be stopping in Cleone every other Wednesday from 930 am till 1000 am. We also tweaked our Anderson Valley stops. We had originally had after our lunch the Floodgate stop and then Boonville but after review we found it necessary to remove floodgate and change that stop to Philo due to lack of use. We also switched the times of the stops, putting the Philo stop before Boonville and we are hoping this reorganization will even out usage, as our patrons now have two options to meet us.

The holiday break saw the Bookmobile out of service for two weeks as we always take the weeks of Christmas and New Year's off. We encouraged our patrons to "stock up" for the break and they sure listened to us and we have been very busy filling requests and accepting returns.

The New Year is off to a great start, the Bookmobile can be found at all our usual stops with full Covid-19 protocols in place.

Increase in COVID-19 cases: In November, the library was considering plans for partial reopening of the branches if the county had remained in the Red Tier for COVID-19 cases. However, the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays resulted in a turn for the worse and county moved back into the Purple Tier where we have remained.





Curbside Pickup & Returns: Many patrons have adjusted amazingly well to the curbside pickup process. They place their requests online and have a steady stream of items arriving every week for them to pick up. For those without internet, people hand us lists (through the door) that they've prepared, or they call on the phone and we place their requests. We aim to please. All items continue to be quarantined after being returned to the library and we're airing them during the three day quarantine period.





Fort Bragg Branch

November and December 2020 continued to show the importance of library services during the pandemic. As colder weather drove people indoors, and gatherings were reduced due to COVID restrictions, our patrons need library material to help them cope with loneliness and distance from friends and family. We saw circulation of 5000 items in December and heard many *thank-yous* and socially-distanced greetings through the door. We promoted voting and provided info on Election Day.



Staff continued online programming. Adult Book Group read and discussed two books over Zoom: On Earth We're Briefly Gorgeous (a novel about the child of Vietnamese immigrants growing up on the East Coast and coming out as a gay writer. Next we discussed H is for Hawk, a British memoir about grief and recovery, seen through the lens of falconry. Over ten attend the zoom book group. Poetry Open mic on Zoom is a strange new world, but still meets the profound need to gather and to speak our minds. It was an honor to hear a young writer from Ukiah (studying at Davis) share their poetry--especially a poem of growing up in the family auto repair shop. We hope to have this writer's published work in our library someday!







Staff has great fun promoting the collection to our patrons. We've been doing Wednesday Watchpick for two months. We've continued to serve a lot of families and children with curbside bags and literacy backpacks. One 4 year old sitting in his car-seat saw a Zebra-Striped Backpack in our children's room window and asked his mother call us to check that out, too, in addition to her bag of books. Talk about Window Shopping! Staff included traditional corn in our Thanksgiving Day Curbside Bags. Kim and Dan read stories online for the Winter Holidays. Valerie's been engaging nearly 600 people with lively Instagram Posts and Fort Bragg Library Facebook is reaching around 700 followers.









Our Annual Friends of Fort Bragg Library Newsletter was posted at year's end, with record of this wonderful wacky year. 2020 saw the Thousand Dollar Club grow to 77 members with over 25,000 in donations this year alone. In the last week of December we received the astonishing news of a bequest from a former patron we enjoyed serving. LaVon Taylor had also worked as a volunteer and paid extra- help at the library over the years and wanted to support the library expansion project. She left an estate to the Friends in the amount of \$470,000. This made it a Happy New Year beyond our wildest dreams!

Round Valley Branch

- Library Closure/reopening. Branch managers at each of the Mendocino County library branches have been working on a plan for re-opening. There are tentative plans for opening two afternoons a week for browsing and checkouts while in the red tier. For the following Tier (orange), the RV branch would be open 5 afternoons a week with computers available. Limits will be placed on the number of people allowed in the building at a time as well as how long they can stay.
- Zoom Story time (for ages 2 to 5) happens on Fridays at 2:00 pm. We currently have a devoted following
 of 5 kids.
- Poetry at the High School. Through a partnership between Round Valley High School English teacher
 Susan Brady and the Round Valley Public Library, poet Susan Wooldridge will be working with H.S.
 English classes this month. This event is supported in part by Poets & Writers. A follow-up program for
 all ages is in the works for the end of November.
- **Reading Radio**, The library's radio show on the theme of books and reading airs on KYBU on Thursdays at 9:00 am and on Saturday at 7:30 pm. The program consists of interviews or audiobooks.
 - Content- Interview with Dane Downing about various projects including the Forrest Reciprocity Group (FRG) and his work as a board member at the Sewer district in Round Valley. To stream the interview online, visit kyburadio.org/library/libradio.mp3.
 - Reading tips from the Round Valley Elementary School's Title 1 Reading Program. Short story by William Steig.

Out of an abundance of caution, we are asking anyone who needs library staff to please wait at the door after knocking or calling and we'll come to you. Please refrain from entering the inside of the library, either by the front door or from the hallway door. While we have made a few exceptions in the past, we will accept deliveries only at the front door. Boxes, etc. will be dropped off immediately inside the front door. At this time, we will not be inviting partners inside the building for making videos, etc.




Our staff have been super busy providing curbside checkout, building our library's social media & virtual presence, & actively planning new ways to keep us connected & thriving.

Children's Library Highlights









- Sweet Saturdays with River Oak: We have continued our partnership with River Oak to host the yearly Sweet Saturdays events this winter. The first one (A Winter Walk in the Woods on Saturday) was successful!
- Story Promenade: The Ukiah Library and City of Ukiah Recreation Department collaborated to provide a new reading opportunity to the community: a month-long Story Promenade! Story promenades are a fun way to enjoy reading while spending time outdoors. This Story Promenade was a temporary exhibit of children's books displayed on discrete boards along a path in Downtown Ukiah, where families could enjoy a new book each week. Books included *The Snowy Day, Corduroy, & Unicorns are the Worst*! Sam is planning for future installations of semi-permanent Story Promenades.
- Kids' Corner: learn about 4-5 new books currently available for curbside pick-up. Each episode may include
 material for various reading interests and reading levels, from picture books and early readers to non-fiction and
 chapter books. Included books recommended for ages 0-11.
- Full STEAM Ahead: Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math Crafts for Kids! This quarter, various learning
 activities have included creating stalactites & stalagmites, making snowflakes, watercolor drop painting, making
 ooblek, & DIY Thermometers.

Teen Program Highlights

• Mad Genius Science Projects for Teens: This quarter, various learning activities have included making snow, smartphone holders (using paper cups, popsicle sticks & hot glue), paper lanterns, & slime!

- Foodie Finds: an educational cooking program teaching teens how to make various savory & sweet snacks using simple ingredients. This quarter, Kat has taught the teens how to make Irish soda-bread & red velvet cake.
- Where the Wild Books Are: Book Talks for Teens offers recommendations for teens & their caregivers. It airs on the third Tuesday of the month at 4 pm.
- Kat is coordinating a new virtual teen hangout using a popular service called Discord. She is actively seeking teen volunteers, and has contacted teachers about teen volunteer opportunities to earn community service credit.

Seed Library Highlights

- The Ukiah Library is 1 of 400 seed hubs with the <u>Co-Op Gardens Commission</u>, a grassroots collective working toward food sovereignty in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, and persistent injustice.
- In addition to maintaining our Seed Library nearly single-handedly & filling seed orders for planting through
 curbside checkout, Jen Lyon has been collaborating with NCO Gardens Project to create seed saving videos for
