Recommendation Regarding Continued Remote Public Meetings of Governmental Bodies

September 29, 2021

In light of the continued state of emergency related to COVID-19, as the County Health Officer, I recommend that public bodies continue to meet remotely to the extent possible.

This recommendation is made due to the continued threat of COVID-19 to this community with the ongoing surge in cases and deaths experienced since the Labor Day holiday, the current county vaccination rate, and a concern for continued risk during the upcoming holidays. Additionally, I make this recommendation based on the unique characteristics of public governmental meetings (such as the increased mixing associated with bringing people together from across the community, the need to enable those who are immunocompromised or unvaccinated to be able to safely continue to fully participate in such governmental meetings, and the challenges with fully ascertaining and ensuring compliance with vaccination and other safety recommendations at such meetings), and the continued increased safety protection that physical/social distancing provides as one means by which to reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission.

Therefore, I strongly recommend teleconferencing through online meetings as this type of meeting presents the lowest risk of transmission of SARS-CoV-2, and allows for the participation of the community, local agency staff, presenters, and local agency governing bodies in a safe environment, with no risk of contagion.

I will continue to evaluate this recommendation on an ongoing basis, paying particular attention to the pandemic stage of our community. I will communicate when there is no longer such a recommendation with respect to meetings for public bodies.

Library Director's Report: Deborah Fader Samson

Though Covid levels again climbing, branches want to stay open with continued safety measures.

- Recruitment for a Point Arena branch librarian and other positions is underway.
- Flammable materials need to be removed from Ukiah Branch basement per safety inspection; discussion ensued with ideas and clarification of the Friends' involvement in this process. Michael and Richard were interested in touring the area.
- Deb is pursuing conversation with auditor's office regarding A-87.
- Working with Barb on: Library Brochure with basic library information for new users; State Annual Report
 with statistics on programs, attendance and circulation; and Library Annual Report for BOS and community
 with highlights of past year, statistics, income and expenses.
- Librarian is working with County Council of policy regarding use of social media.
- In collaboration with Sonoma County, working on updating catalogs.
- CENIC broadband is a work in progress; each branch has specific needs that are being addressed.
- County approved use of \$500,000 PG&E funds for backup generators, but timeline in not known. County is
 also waiting for more information about solar grants which may impact generator needs. We will revisit at
 November meeting.
- Laytonville undergoing a safety inspection and is closer to opening.

Admin Services Manager's Budget Report: Barb Chapman

- Year 20-21 still open, but almost complete
- Starting the year with about \$2 million in reserves
- Endowment Funds has a balance of \$259,016.45 which is broken down by branch principal and interest. The library may spend the interest, but needs LAB approval to use principal funds.

Coast Community Library Branch Report – Julia Larke

Julia acknowledged the work staff and volunteers do and thanked the branch and greater library staff, Friends of the Library and the LAB for the great work done and the support she has received. She embraced Library Sign up Month with Carolyn Cook and shared pictures of community members proudly holding an oversize library card. Julia highlighted programs and themes such as Latino Heritage and take-home kits with ideas for

art and writing. Julia will be retiring soon and will help until a replacement can be found. Nancy Morin, president of the Coast Friends spoke expressing the community's appreciation of the exemplary, creative, engaging, and committed treasure Julia has been in her work. It was clear that Julia and the role of the library in the community is quite special.

Report on Ad Hoc Committee A-87 Charges

- Resolution 21-118 was adopted by the BOS August 17, 2021 to include the definition of "Library Funds" and to expand the list of exemption of A-87 charges and to define a process of going forward.
- Deb will request the data needed to begin looking at line by line charges.
- There is currently personnel turnover in the auditor's office.

Measure A Subcommittee:

- Michael has sent out copy of language to several people for input and review.
- December 13 is the earliest date to file for something to be on the November 2022 ballet.
- By November 17th meeting, there should be a final draft of measure.
- LAB members to inform their Friends Groups of plans and timelines for support in the campaign.

Unfinished Business

- Point Arena is currently working with city on drainage issues. They are considering roof replacement and improvements for better air circulation. They are sending out an appeal for donations.
- Ukiah- Importance of working with city and county on effort was discussed; branch's needs explained
 including the impact of the greater service area that the Ukiah branch serves.
- Fort Bragg is applying for property tax exemption.
- Laytonville continues to slowly but surely approach opening.
- Willits Planned improvements are waiting for county, so library admin will be the first to know when something happens.

LIBRARY DIRECTOR'S REPORT FOR LIBRARY ADVISORY BOARD MEETING NOV 17, 2021

- Barb did an amazing job putting together the Library Annual Report that highlights all
 the statistics and news of the 2020-2021 fiscal year. It's available for your review on the
 Library website, but it's huge so I don't think it's appropriate as a tool to get "Joe the
 Plumber" to vote for the increased tax in November 2022.
- If all goes according to plan, Mellisa Hannum will start work on December 27th as the Coast Community Branch's new Branch Librarian. She currently works at Nevada County Library, but grew up in Humboldt County and can't wait to get back to the coast. She is halfway through obtaining her M.L.I.S. at San Jose State University. Julia has agreed to stay on for an extra week to work with her for a smooth transition. We also just hired a second permanent part-time position for that branch so there will be one full-time Librarian and two part-time Library Assistants.
- I have taken three out of a dozen CSAC (California State Association of Counties) classes
 necessary to be certified as having graduated from the CSAC William "Bill" Chiat
 Institute for Excellence in County Government. This is a professional,
 practical continuing education program for senior county staff and elected
 officials, the goal of which is to expand capacity and capability of county
 elected officials and senior staff to provide extraordinary services to their
 communities.
- I have been working on an official Library Social Media Policy with County Counsel, but they are waiting to see what happens with some current litigation and have asked me to put it on hold until they know a really safe way forward. (The County was sued by someone whose inaccurate post urging people not to get vaccinated was removed by the Public Health Department from their Facebook page.) It is against the law to remove anyone's statement no matter how false or inflammatory it may be. In the meantime, staff have been instructed to not remove, edit, or hide any comments from members of the public on any social media platform that we currently use.
- Barb and Nayo, with very little assistance from me, completed the Annual State Library report, which was due on November 5th this year. Each year the State changes a little bit of the information that they ask for, so each year represents a new challenge. They did an amazing job!
- The Board of Supervisors allowed the Library branches to close on Tuesdays after Monday holidays so the staff can have three day weekends like everybody else in the County workforce. Ultimately, this will save us money by not having to hire Extra Help staff to fill in for staff who must then take an alternate holiday that week.
- The Bookmobile Dudes' have moved their office to the basement, relieving some of the psychological congestion upstairs. There are still many boxes of books that the FOL are

storing that need to be removed for safety and so that Outreach materials and CSA items can be stored safely. If anyone on the LAB is interested in joining me, some other CSA staff, and some of the able bodied Ukiah branch Friends to remove the flammable material, please let me know and we can schedule it.

- Outreach staff participated in PumpkinFest on October 16th and 17th
- The City of Ten Thousand Buddhas and Dharma Realm Buddhist University donated several boxes of masks, hand sanitizer, and rubber gloves to the Cultural Services Agency.



- We are working on a grant, headed up by Barb, for an opening collection and furniture for the Laytonville branch. The architect who designed the space did not know a lot about libraries so we are having some technical difficulties to work around (the plans have already been approved by Planning and Building Dept.), but we still hope to open by the end of the end of the first quarter of the calendar year.
- I have served on a couple employee committee meetings to help draft a new County Strategic Plan and have mentioned at every one of them the need to fully fund the Cultural Services Agency as a necessity in attracting families to reside in Mendocino County due to the high quality of life we provide.
- The Community Foundation recently opened their application for Community Enrichment Grants for local non-profit entities. A member of the Ukiah Branch Friends of the Library attended one of the instructional meetings and we are hoping he is working with Sam White on an application to fund the purchase of StoryWalk ® signs to be placed permanently in the communities of our branches. The Coast Community Friends of the Library are applying for a grant to purchase the StoryWalk ® signs for a park in Point Arena.
- 11 candidates for the Young Adult Librarian position at Ukiah branch have attended their first round of interviews. We hope to make a selection by the end of the month and have someone on site by the end of the year.
- Friends of the Ukiah Branch Library generously purchased and donated TWO 3-D printers to that branch. Because of the central tenet of libraries being the equal access to resources for everyone despite their socioeconomic or any other perceived status, we

do not want to limit access to 3-D printing only to those patrons who signed up for a card at that branch. We want to make the technology available for every cardholder in the County. One other branch (Round Valley?) already has a 3-D printer, but we'd like to request that other Friends of the Library groups consider helping to purchase the filament necessary to operate the printers so that the Ukiah Friends group doesn't have to support the county-wide endeavor alone. Their hearts are truly large, but they shouldn't have to pay for the entire county.

- Our recent M.L.I.S. graduate, Nayo Sicard is now officially a Librarian II; providing services and guidance for all the branches and outreach.
- The CA State Library is paying for 6 databases for public libraries around the state until the end of September 2022. The databases are: Coursera, GetSetUp, Learning Express Library, LinkedIn Learning, Northstar, and Skillshare.

Nothing feels more fall than cozying up with a good book. The **Willits Library** has an abundance on display as they simultaneously celebrate Banned Book Week and Hispanic Heritage Month.

Banned Book Week is an annual awareness campaign promoted by the American Library Association (ALA) Office for Intellectual Freedom that celebrates the freedom to read and combats censorship, defending First Amendment Rights. This year's theme is "Books Unite Us, Censorship Divides Us." From Sept. 26-Oct. 2, titles that have been challenged or banned throughout history are proudly displayed in different sections of the **library**. In the children's section, an explanation is offered to why the book was challenged or banned to promote discussion. The ALA provides the following definitions of challenged and banned books; "A challenge is an attempt to remove or restrict materials, based upon the objections of a person or a group, a banning is the removal of those materials." Every year, the ALA Office for Intellectual Freedom compiles a list of the top ten challenged books of the year.

Books are often challenged for a variety of reasons, such as but not limited to; racist content, sexuality, profanity, drugs and drinking, violence, religious viewpoint and leftist propaganda. Years ago, The Lorax by Dr. Suess was challenged in Mendocino County because it was thought to be anti-logging industry. Presently, the ALA continues to see an increase in challenges to LGBTQIA+ materials and programming. Challengers attempt to remove materials and programs from libraries and schools however censorship of such materials creates a barrier to the freedom to read and limits citizens First Amendment Rights.

Branch Librarian Nicole Bird said, "It good to recognize Banned Books week because that is one of the cornerstones of American Democracy, the right to read whatever you want without being censored. Everyone should be able to decide what is right for them to read." Bird also pointed out that bringing awareness is a way to prevent censorship in the future, ensuring a continued freedom to read. She said, "That's one of the freedoms that we have to be careful to preserve."

Hispanic Heritage Month is being celebrated at the **library** from September 15- October 15. Along with displays for the occasion, the **library** hosted an art project making event outside in the Mendocino County Museum courtyard. October 2 Amate Bark Paintings were made, a traditional folk art from the Mexican State of Puebla.

In conjunction with Hispanic Heritage Month, Bird has posted videos on Facebook for 'Nicole Test

Kitchen' showing how patrons can make a guiro, Guatemalan Worry Dolls and Loteria at home. Bird said, "It's always good to celebrate different cultures when we can, so people can learn and enjoy... or celebrate if that is part of their heritage."

There is an interactive fall mural in the window and patrons are encouraged to pick up a leaf or raindrop to color or write in and add to the display.

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As the spread of COVID-19 continues throughout the world, the need for personal protective equipment (PPE) remains high, especially for front line staff. To address the ongoing demand, the City of Ten Thousand Buddhas (CTTB), Dharma Realm Buddhist University (DRBU) and their parent organization, Dharma Realm Buddhist Association (DRBA) have expanded their PPE donation project, to supply PPE to the Mendocino County Library and the County Museum.

There will be 6,000 surgical masks, 120 bottles of hand sanitizer and 10,000 vinyl gloves donated for the use of library and museum staff and visitors. All PPE will be distributed to the library branches throughout Ukiah, Willits, Fort Bragg, Point Arena and Covelo, as well as to the traveling Bookmobile and the County Museum, located in Willits.

"A strong sense of community is a guiding principle at DRBU, as we integrate care into all that we do," DRBU President, Susan Rounds, said. "The Mendocino County Library and the County Museum are vital to the DRBU community and to our neighbors throughout the county. We are honored to contribute to ensuring the health and safety of its staff and visitors."

In addition to DRBU students and staff, members and friends of Dharma Realm Buddhist Association in China, including the Buddhist Association of China and Jing Ming Vihara of China, contributed to the donated supplies. To certify the quality of the PPE, all items come with a copy of the manufacturer's business license and FDA and/or CE (Europe) and/or ISO (international) certificate.

Everybody has driven, been driven, ridden, or walked over the Noyo River Bridge, but most of us don't think about what is beneath our feet as we pass. There's a lot to see and do at the North Harbor, but if you want to see everything, you have to go exploring. If you like to read, there's a good reason to drive all the way to the end of the road.

The Friends of the **Library** runs a tiny hallway of a used-book shop, open from 11:00 until 3:00 Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays, just to the left of the Princess Seafood Restaurant (not the market/deli). The parking lot is reserved for restaurant customers, but you can park along the foot of the bluff and at the very end of the road, where people go to enjoy the mouth of the river.

The bookshop has more than books; it has magazines, LPs, CDs, and DVDs (including box sets). There's a view over the dock to the river, and you can check out the mermaid mailbox, the unique awning (also with a marine theme), and the interesting posters (whales, maps). Everything, including the use of the shop space, has been donated, and the stock is grouped by medium and category (fiction, non-fiction, poetry, children's, etc.). On the first Saturday of each month, The Friends accept material donations in the alley to the left and behind the Ft. **Bragg Library** (499 E. Laurel, at Whipple) from 9:00 until noon. (The **library** itself is not currently accepting donations.) In addition to running the used-book shop, The Friends holds sales every few months.



Working Group to Improve Ukiah Library

Report for Library Advisory Board: Needs Analysis of the Ukiah Valley Library

11-17-2021

Arch Nexus has completed the Needs Assessment. Here are the primary points from their summary.

The existing library is 14,410 square feet with approximately 11,000 square feet of space accessible to the public. The findings in the study recommend a total building size of approximately 20,000 square feet to meet the needs of the community from 2021 -2031.

It is recommended that the library look at the cost and feasibility of partnerships, alternate locations, the purchase of the adjacent property and the cost of second story addition to find the most cost effective way to implement the recommended increased size of the building.

The report included additional recommendations of how to implement a plan to configure and expand the library size: what to include and how to reconfigure the space within the library. A portion of these configurations and layout recommendation could be implements now, by reconfiguring the existing library.

The next step recommendations are as follows:

- Confirm a potential partner (in addition to the City and County) then complete a location feasibility study.
- 2) As part of the feasibility study confirm a site location, (Real estate acquisition or adjacent site purchase feasibility).
- 3) Second story level additional Structural Feasibility and cost study
- 4) SEED Certified Community Outreach (Can be completed by SEED certified architectural firm as part of the programming and design phases).

The FOL has started on what would be needed to determine if a second story is feasible. That will require an RFP (Request for Proposal) with a structural engineering company. We are hopeful that the county or the city will take the lead on that.

The final report Needs Assessment report is pretty long (32 pages), so we won't attach it here.

HELLO, MENDOCINO COUNTY!

Message from the County Librarian



Thank you so much for welcoming me so warmly to this beautiful part of the country. I started as your Cultural Services Agency Director on January 25th and have been amazed at the dedication and professionalism of both Library and Museum staff. Prior to my appointment here, I had worked as County Librarian for Tuolumne County, CA and as Branch Manager for the Public Library of Albuquerque and Bernalillo County in New Mexico. I've worked in libraries all over the country from Dayton, OH to Monterey, CA to San Angelo, TX to Augusta, GA to Las Cruces, NM and have met so many different people dedicated to serving the public through Libraries. I have worked in larger systems with larger budgets, but never with such a hard working staff before.

Since my tenure began in January, I have been able to visit every branch in the County Library system and meet all the staff, appreciating the traits and eccentricities of each unique community despite

the new restrictions placed on us by this pandemic. Library branches are still not open to the public at prepandemic levels, but we're hopeful that we will be able to do that eventually.

Our branches have continued to serve their communities well over the past year, with online programming, take-and-make crafts, curbside pick-up, social me-

dia games and challenges, and telephone reference assistance while closed, and adding browsing and computer assistance since re-opening in late March. In the following pages Branch Managers will highlight their branch's accomplishments over the past year and let you know some of their hopes for the future.

I am proud that during my time

here we have placed an emphasis on staff development and training and are in the process of eliminating late fees for overdue materials, which really only serve as a barrier to access for those in our community who need us the most. All of our branches are getting set up with high-speed broadband access through the Corporation for Education Network Initiatives in California (CENIC) this year, enabling us to serve even more residents in the remote areas of our County.

Thank you to the amazing Cultural Services Agency staff, The Library Advisory Board, and all the individual Friends of the Library groups that do so much for our branches on a daily basis. What a great team!

My goals for the upcoming year are to open the new Laytonville Branch in early 2022, to set up Story Walks® in our communities, and to bring all our branches together as members of the same Library with a shared identity.

Coast Community Branch Library

Located in Point Arena, Mendocino County's smallest city, this branch serves south coast communities from Elk to Gualala and further south into Sonoma County, including Sea Ranch, Annapolis and Stewarts Point.

During the summer of 2020 until March 2021, the branches provided curbside pickup of materials. Many patrons were able to place requests online at home and for those without internet, people handed staff lists (through the door), or they called and had requests placed for them. Since March, staff have returned to checking out materials in person and allowing use of the study rooms and public computers. Patrons and visitors from afar have begun to visit the branch (while masked!) with greater frequency.

People are also now coming inside to buy books at the ongoing Friends of the Library Book Sale that is temporarily located in the Community Room. The space is functioning like a mini bookstore and sales are at an all-time high. This is a fine use of the room until public programs and classes can be resumed.

During the 2020 Summer Reading Program in July and August, branches were open only for curbside pickup so staff provided a cart at the front door supplied with free Scholastic Books and weekly craft go-bags. The Time-Capsule booklet project was very popular with Coast Community families. The creator of the booklet made it available on the web, saying, "Because we're living through history right now I thought a 'time capsule' would be an amazing way for children to document this experience."

In September, branch staff celebrated Mendocino County Library's award of



a grant from the American Library Association and the Women's Suffrage Centennial Commission commemorating the 100th anniversary of the ratification of the 19th amendment.

In October, Coast Branch posted its first YouTube videos...the reading of two children's books that were part of a Census book grant the County Library received.

In December, they presented a video of a book talk by local Comptche author and historian, Katie Tahja, sharing her latest book, *An Eclectic History of Mendocino County*.

In January and February, Branch Manager Julia Larke created a poster honoring Martin Luther King Jr. and his 1968 *I Have A Dream* speech and posted it on social media. For Black History Month they highlighted books, movies and audiobooks in a window display, including the works of Maya Angelou, James Baldwin, Ta-Nehisi Coates, Toni Morrison, Alice Walker, Colson Whitehead, Isabel Wilkerson, and many more.

In March, Julia applied and was awarded a \$500 grant from the California State Library's ELF project (Early Learning with Families). For día de los niños, día de los libros (Children's Day/Book Day), held April 29, they hosted a bilingual zoom fairytale told by Point Arena's Poet Laureate, Blake More and retired Ukiah Poet Laureate, Jabez William Churchill.

At the end of March the County Library gradually began reopening the branches to the public. On Earth Day, held April 22, Coast Branch provided a Seeds and Starts Giveaway table near the entrance to the library and gave away dozens of borage and sunflower seedlings as well as seed packets that had been donated to the seed library by Territorial Seed Co.

In June, Coast Branch hosted a You-Tube video for all ages by author and "Sightings" newspaper columnist, Jeanne Jackson, titled *Baby Animals of the Mendonoma Coast* and staff began producing videos of their preschool *Story Time @ the Library with Marilyn*.

Staff are looking forward to resuming full in-person programming. Although we are living in pandemic times, the library continues to function as a community center, a place where individuals can come (wearing masks!) to share, explore, learn, and create.

Fort Bragg Branch Library

Curbside pick-up turned out great for people familiar with our online catalog, but it was harder for those who liked to browse. The Fort Bragg staff jumped in and became expert weekly shoppers for their patrons. Families with young children had the toughest time, but they became our top requesters, checking out huge bags of picture books each week. Summer Reading 2020 proceeded undeterred. Children's Librarian, Kim Doyle, mailed Game Boards to all kids who'd played in the past three years. By summer's end, kids had won free ice cream, books and teeshirts. Prizes were passed out at our door to maintain social distancing. The cold weather moved circulation to our front lobby, and patrons continued to visit in droves. Some days the phone never stopped ringing. Through parts of the pandemic, the branch circulated up to 5000 items per month.

Kids enjoyed online recordings of stories and craft programs. Monthly book group and Poetry Open Mic for adults continued on Zoom, which was especially appreciated when the town was locked down. The monthly poetry-writing workshop continue by email. Online meetings offered mental stimulation and helped to preserve a sense of community.

In March the branch reopened. To welcome back patrons in person, their local origami master made butterflies for all to take and make. At







the center of the table was an origami redwood tree, a lasting symbol of the City of Fort Bragg.

Ocean Wave Quilters celebrated our reopening with a tie-dye challenge that brought colorful quilts to every wall. Then the branch hosted a spectacular quilt show depicting the iconic buildings of Mendocino town. Each building was stitched in meticulous detail and was accompanied by a matching photograph. The library displayed its extensive holdings of local history books on Mendocino and provided a tour map so people could visit the historic buildings. People were overjoyed to see this exhibit and be in a living, breathing library. (Well-masked, of course!)

The Friends of the Fort Bragg Library did not go dormant in the pandemic, but continued to raise funds for library programs and the building project. Online sales were phenomenal, reaching nearly \$10,000. The \$1000 Club grew to 80 donors. A sizeable beguest came into the library in December 2020, boosting the expansion funds by \$450,000. The group prepared a brochure for financial advisors and law firms. The generous donations allow the Friends to seek a fundraising package that clearly defines building costs and starts the search for architectural firms. With well-defined costs, the Friends will be able to pursue public grants and private funding.

The staff members of Fort Bragg Library cordially invite you to visit and experience the collections, programs, and feeling of a thriving community library.

Round Valley Branch Library







2020 was the year of the Zoom call. The Round Valley branch utilized this format for a variety of programs including children's story time, workshops for adults, and emergency preparedness presentations. Radio was also a big part of library outreach during closure: Reading Radio on KYBU featured weekly interviews with community members on the theme of literacy and books. Finally, the branch used social media to reach the community while library doors were closed. Visitors to the Round Valley branch Facebook page were treated to videos featuring origami instructions, virtual library tours, and tips on wildfire preparedness.

In the months before the branch opened its doors in March of 2021, priority number one in Covelo was serving library users with in-person services such as curbside checkout of books and movies, printing and scanning services, "grab and go" craft kits, and tabling outreach at the local farmers market. In August and September, the library posted evacuation maps and other public safety materials for those affected by the August Complex Fire.

With renewed interest in growing and preserving food, the seed library in Round Valley shared seeds at our local Farmers Market, and through community partnerships with the Yuki Trails Human Services Program and Round Valley Family Resource Center. The seed library distributed over 6000 seed packets in the last two years. Outdoor events included monthly planting parties and seed and seedling swaps.

In January, The Round Valley branch was honored to host local poet Michelle Peñaloza on Zoom. Michelle facilitated a writing workshop for an enthusiastic crowd who responded to engaging writing prompts and a discussion of hybrid writing forms. Participants left the program with original writing that combined elements of poetry, prose, and creative nonfiction.

This spring, The Round Valley Branch collaborated with the Mendocino County Museum on an event for middle and high school students. The Youth History Slam happened in April on Zoom and included students from Mendocino and Monterey counties. Jen Harness, a student from Round Valley, shared a wonderful presentation on the Northwestern Pacific Railroad that included stop action animation. Jen's presentation won "Best presentation" at the SLAM.

Entering into the 2021 wildfire season, community members representatives ioined Mendocino County Fire Safe Council and Sherwood Firewise Communities for an online presentation hosted by the branch. Topics included evacuation preparedness, home hardening, and community organizing and preparedness. This presentation was part of an ongoing "Learn Not to Burn" program series; over the following months library staff members shared information and resources on the Mendoalerts emergency alert system, family communication plans, and the Firesafe Council's chipping program.

Ukiah Branch Library

The Ukiah Branch Library serves as a community-gathering place and a connectivity hub for all residents. Connecting people with information, educational resources, myriad learning opportunities, and with one another, patrons discover new ways to inhabit their worlds. Patrons of all ages visit the branch to access WiFi and public computers; borrow library materials including Chromebooks, ukuleles, and board games, and attend regular events such as Children's Story-Time, Teen Maker Squad, and First Fridays.


The Yokayo Seed Project has provided seeds to patrons throughout the pandemic. In fall 2020, branch staff offered Seed Pack Bundles via curbside checkout and collaborated with the NCO Gardens Project to create Mendo Seed Talks: a series of seed saving videos for patrons available via social media. Seed Library Coordinator, Jen Lyon, fostered Tomato Hornworms in our Seed Library. Staff are proud to be 1 of 400 seed hubs with the Co-Op Gardens Commission, a grassroots collective working toward food sovereignty in response to the pandemic and persistent injustice.

While the branches were closed to the public, the staff continued to work in various capacities: behind the scenes answering reference and readers' advisory requests; fulfilling contact-free curbside services; preparing for reopening; serving as disaster workers - answering calls at the call center, checking temperatures, & performing COVID contact tracing.

During the summer of 2020, the branch began offering many virtual children's programs including Full STEAM Ahead: Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math Crafts for Kids; Kids' Corner book talks; 1000 Books Before Kindergarten on Beanstack; and Sweet Saturdays in partnership with local school River Oak. During the spring of 2021, they offered DIY Take-Home Mother's







and Father's Day Card kits for children to mail to seniors in retirement communities and Story Promenades, temporary exhibits of children's books displayed on boards along paths in various parks in downtown Ukiah, in partnership with the City of Ukiah Recreation Department.

Young Adult Librarian Katrina Griffiths expanded the number of virtual pro-

grams for teens on Instagram and Discord, including Foodie Finds: an educational cooking program; Mad Genius Science Projects; Money Smart Week Budgeting 101, and DIY Take-Home Self-Care Kits.

In July, 2020 branch staff formed the Social Justice Book Club dedicated to promoting social and racial justice in the Ukiah community. They read and discussed many powerful books including *Caste* by Isabel Wilkerson. This book club is still active on Zoom and will continue to be offered.

The 2021 UkiaHaiku Festival (UHF) was produced as an online virtual event hosted by our outgoing Ukiah Poet Laureate, Roberta Werdinger, and conducted by our incoming Poet Laureate and Branch Librarian, Melissa Eleftherion Carr. In collaboration with the Poet Laureate Committee of Ukiah, the Ukiah Library also hosted a memorial tribute and poetry reading to honor the late poet, Diane di Prima. The monthly LOBA (she-wolf) Poetry Series resumed and continues live virtually with an Open Mic poetry reading on Zoom.

To support and sustain community resiliency, Ukiah branch staff have provided a variety of DIY Take-Home Kits for Adults including DIY Eye Pillows, Tabletop Fountains, and DIY Rose Petal Sachets, to help with ameliorating insomnia, fostering relaxation, and aiding rest.

Patrons and staff alike enjoyed a wonderful first day of reopening! Within the span of 4 hours, staff welcomed 175 patrons into the branch. Visiting (briefly) with friendly faces and assisting patrons with requests buoyed everyone's spirits. As our society recovers from wildfires and COVID, the staff have begun to reintegrate more in-person and hybrid events outdoors and as safely as possible. Staff are grateful to be part of the Ukiah community.

Willits Branch Library

Virtual Programming

For the safety of the staff and community, all programming was virtual during the 20/21 fiscal year. Staff created three ongoing programs to stay connected with their community, each small but with consistent viewership.

- Nicole's Test Kitchen Craft Edition- This program, which began in April of 2020, focuses on crafts that are for adults or children with adult supervision.
- Nicole's Test Kitchen STEAM Edition- This program, which started at the same time, focuses on Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math projects for school-age children.
- Make it. Own it. Work it- began in July 2020 and features practical crafts for teens and adults that can be used or worn.

Though they had to work around internet outages from a winter storm and other technical difficulties, the staff learned how to stay connected and now have skills to apply to future programming.

Curbside Service

From July 2020 to March 2021 the staff served 3,222 patrons through curbside service. They regularly answered requests to "find me five movies that are funny" or "Can you just put some good audio books in my bag?"

Staff never just grabbed random items from the shelves; they always tried to remember what kind of items their patrons had gotten prepandemic to match their individual tastes. Some folks still pick up materials curbside even though branch

doors opened back up 5 days each week beginning in the spring.

Holiday Programming

Willits branch staff love to celebrate Halloween. Pre-pandemic, they hosted a Halloween carnival every year that was loved by the community. So instead, they hosted three virtual programs that were Halloween themed and put together trick or treat bags filled will books, stickers, and toys and dressed up as witches and wizards to hand out curbside pick-up bags.

Community Engagement

The Willits branch of the library is a hub of activity and staff wanted to make sure their community could still connect with each other. Julie Castillo, a Library Assistant, designed a Gratitude Dahlia by creating petals and asking patrons to write down something that they loved about the library, or were grateful for in general, and then color those petals and return them to be added to the mural in the branch's front window. All the petals built a large and beautiful flower of positivity at the branch.

They decided to keep the idea going by continuing to have a mural in the front window that is built by community input, changing out the dahlia for a scene with raindrops and leaves.

Collaboration with the Museum

The Mendocino County Museum is a physical neighbor of the Willits branch as well as a figurative neighbor under the umbrella of the Cultural Services Agency of the County.

In the spring the Library and Museum partnered for a virtual event







showcasing different kinds of printmaking during their exhibit "The Art of the Wind and Sea," which featured community art. The Branch and Museum also partnered for an outdoor series of Summer Reading events.

Fiscal year 2020-2021 saw a welcome increase in library revenue. Sales tax revenue increased by 50% over FY 2019-2020. Additionally, the library was awarded a grant of \$85,341 from the California State Library for expenses to join the CENIC broadband network. This amounted to a 32% increase in total revenue.

The COVID pandemic has impacted budgets by causing unpredictable

swings in revenue. We are hoping that the increased revenue continues, but year-to-year fluctuations are likely to persist. We still have facility projects that have been deferred for another year.

Some savings were recovered from the COVID closures. When staff left employment with the library their positions were not immediately filled, there was no security guard necessary while the Ukiah branch was closed, and there was a reduction in purchasing of items like magazines and newspapers that patrons were not able to come in and enjoy. Consequently, expenditures were 8% less than the prior year.

Now that branches have reopened, we have resumed hiring the staff needed to serve our communities and a security guard is once again stationed at the Ukiah branch.

High-Speed Broadband for Mendocino County Library!

The Corporation for Education Network Initiatives in California (CENIC) high speed broadband connections will go live soon at most of the County Library branches!

The Mendocino County Library system, CENIC, and the California State Library through the Califa Group are partnering to provide direct connection of 1 Gbps to the entire Library system. Final components, such as switches and firewalls, are currently being installed and upgraded internal rewiring of the Willits Branch will be completed soon. Due to its remote location. Round Valley's connection will take a bit longer. However, we are very pleased that the branch will be obtaining a fiber-optic broadband connection as well!

The California State Library has awarded \$85,341 to the Mendocino County Library to assist with one-time expenses. Since 2014, the California State Li-

brary has partnered with CENIC to help fund "Lighting Up Libraries" to provide improved broadband for patrons to enjoy all the benefits that come with excellent broadband connections.

CENIC aims to ensure that all California residents have access to high speed networks at their public libraries and educational institutions, and so far has connected over 88% of public libraries in the State to the network. CENIC connects California to the world - advancing education and research statewide by providing a world-class network essential for innovation, collaboration, and economic growth.

Although some reimbursable expenses will need to be paid for in the first year or two, by joining this network consortium, the Library branches will have much improved broadband connections and save money at the same time.

Message from the Library Advisory Board

The Library Advisory Board (LAB) was created by the Mendocino County Board of Supervisors in 1970 to act in an advisory capacity to the Board of Supervisors, the Library Director, and the County Chief Executive Office regarding issues of library operations and services. The LAB has nine active members: one from each supervisorial district and one from each of the incorporated cities. Supervisorial representatives serve threeyear terms and city representatives serve two-year terms. The LAB welcomes input from the general population.

The LAB's strategic plan envi-

sions future library projects and programs to enhance users' educational and community-based activities in all five branches and the Bookmobile. Additionally, the LAB monitors library revenue and expenditures and ensures that dedicated library funds are not comingled with the other County departments or monies.

One of the upcoming plans of the LAB is to expand or relocate the Ukiah branch. They have been working with the Friends of the Ukiah Library to have a Needs Assessment conducted, the results of which can be seen here.

The LAB is supporting a citizens'

initiative for the 2022 ballot to increase the sales tax percentage dedicated to our libraries from 1/8 of a penny to 1/4 of a penny and make that change permanent for future services, materials, outreach, and building improvements and expansions.

Attend a LAB Meeting!

All Library Advisory Board meetings are open to the public. The LAB meets every other month starting in January on the third Wednesday of the month. Meetings have been taking place over Zoom throughout the pandemic and will continue to do so until such time as it is safe to meet in person.
